A Closer Look: **Syracuse City Police Department**

When you need a Police Officer, head to the building from which we work. The old City Hall and the old Public Safety building were remodeled to become the new Syracuse City Police building. This building will adequately service the community for the next twenty years, which will save taxpayers thousands of dollars.

The Police Department offers the citizens of Syracuse many services. We do vacation checks when citizens are away from home. We fingerprint people for their new jobs, missions or military services. We teach hunter safety, merit badge classes, defensive

driving courses, and neighborhood watch groups. We have scout groups, church groups and civic groups tour the Police Station. We also assist our Youth Court in their mission and efforts.

The sleepy little town of Syracuse has grown a lot. The day where one Officer could handle all the calls and then go home and be "on call" all night are over. Crimes, vehicular crashes, medicals, public addresses, and citizen assists keep nineteen Police Officers very busy everyday. Besides taking calls for crimes committed, Officers carry out traffic control, watch

City Council Meeting Summary


The City Council met in work session and business meeting on Tuesday, January 11, 2011. Following is a summary of the meetings:

January 11 Work Session: With the recent appointment of Councilmember Ocaña to fill the vacancy left by former-Councilmember Hammond, it was necessary for the Council to review the various assignments and appointments each of them hold. The Council made the decision to eliminate the practice of assigning a Councilmember to one of each of the City's Departments. All other assignments were reviewed and a new Resolution memorializing the assignments will be considered during the February 8 business meeting. The Council then discussed a request from the North Davis Sewer District that the City waive connection and impact fees for properties they wish to connect to the City's secondary water system. Building Inspector Tex Couch presented background information to the Council and explained that City staff recommended that the request be denied. He explained that the District owns property with homes on it and they plan to rent the homes as a revenue generating source for the District. He explained that it has not been the practice of the City in the past to waive or reduce fees for any revenue generating project. Mayor Nagle stated she was concerned that waiving the fees would start the City down a 'slippery slope' and she was not in favor of granting the District's request for the same reasons mentioned by Mr. Couch. She stated that the Council could make a final determination during the business meeting. During the Council Business portion of the meeting Acting City Manager Mike Waite reported that he has considered several options for 'going green' in the City and one that he would like to put in place during the upcoming growing season is the use of goats to maintain weeds on City owned properties. He provided some details of the idea to the Council; the Council was in favor of further investigation of the idea. Councilmember Peterson explained that he was approached by a citizen that asked if it would be possible for the City to use the parcel of ground located directly east of City Hall as a second community garden. Mr. Waite stated he would check to see if it would be possible to provide secondary water to the parcel of ground. The Council liked the idea of adding a second community garden in a location that would serve residents on the west side of the City.

January 11 Business Meeting: Agenda Item 3: The Council unanimously voted to adopt Proposed Resolution R11-01 appointing Robert Rice as the City Manager of Syracuse City. Mayor Nagle explained that Colonel Rice is currently serving as the Commander of the Marine Corps Base in Hawaii. He will be leaving that post near the end of January and begin his employment with Syracuse City on February 3. She stated she is very excited for Col. Rice to join the staff. **Agenda**

Item 4: Wood-Richards and Associates presented the audit report for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010 to the City Council. He explained that he feels that the City's Finance Manager Amber Fowles and other City staff in conjunction with the Governing Body are doing good work to improve the City's financial situation. He commended Ms. Fowles for putting new and improved accounting practices into place in order to better protect the City. The Council also commended Ms. Fowles for her hard work and thanked her for her dedication to proper oversight of the City's budget and finances. **Agenda Items 5 and 6:** City staff explained that Dr. Sheldon Peck made an application to the City to rezone three lots in the Hammon Acres Subdivision from Agricultural use to Residential use. Upon approval of the rezone, the developer requested sketch plan approval for the Hammon Acres Subdivision. The Council unanimously approved both requests. **Agenda Item 7:** The Council considered Proposed Resolution R11-02 which would put into place a new practice for the Mayor to select citizens to be appointed to the City's Planning Commission. The intent of the practice is to avoid instances in the future where a position on the Planning Commission may be vacant for an extended period of time. **Agenda Item 8:** The Council considered an Ordinance that would amend titles eight and ten of the City Code. Community Development Director Michael Eggett explained that the more significant changes deal with title ten and he reviewed some of those changes for the Council. Mayor Nagle stated that she would like for consideration of the Ordinance to be tabled so that the Council can have additional time to review the recommendations and discuss them at length during the next extended work session meeting scheduled for January 25. The Council voted unanimously to table final consideration of the Ordinance. **Item 9:** The Council considered a request from the North Davis Sewer District for the waiver of connection and impact fees (see work session agenda summary). The Council voted unanimously to deny the request made by the District on the basis that the project that the request

was related to was considered a 'revenue generating project'. **Item 10:** The Council held a public hearing to consider Proposed Ordinance 11-03 adopting rewrites of titles one and two of the City Code. A motion was made to adopt the Ordinance, after which Councilmember Shingleton requested that language be added to a section of the rewrite, which reads as follows: "when necessary, (the Mayor shall have the power and duty to) call on the residents of the City over the age of twenty one (21) years to assist in enforcing the laws of the state and ordinances of the City" Councilmember Shingleton stated that he wanted to add language specifying that such an action must be in accordance with the State and U.S. Constitutions. The Council discussed Councilmember Shingleton's request; Councilmember's Kimmel and Shingleton argued that some citizens may feel that some ordinances or laws of the City are unconstitutional and



they would like for the suggested language to be added in order to protect the citizens from the government. Mayor Nagle argued that any ordinance or law of the City must be adopted by a majority vote of the Council and Councilmember's are elected by the citizens of the City to represent their interests. Councilmember Peterson stated that he was not opposed to the language, but he felt that it is given that any action must be in accordance with the State and U.S. Constitution and it did not make sense to only add the language to that one section of the City Code. Councilmember Clark added that the Constitution(s) are open for interpretation and one person may have a different interpretation than their neighbor. After the discussion concluded Mayor Nagle called for a vote on the original motion to adopt the Ordinance. Councilmember's Clark, Ocaña, and Peterson voted in favor of adopting the Ordinance as it was presented. Councilmember's Kimmel and Shingleton voted in opposition of the motion. Councilmember Shingleton then offered a substitute motion to add the language recommended by himself and subsequently adopt the Ordinance. Councilmember's Kimmel and Shingleton voted in favor of the motion; Councilmember's Clark, Ocaña, and Peterson voted in opposition. Councilmember Shingleton later stated that he supports the rewritten versions of titles one and two with the exception of the section referenced during the discussion. ✎

Frozen Water Pipe Prevention

The winter months mean freezing outdoor temperatures which can cause water lines to freeze. Frozen pipes can burst and cause extensive water damage. An eighth-inch (three millimeter) crack in a pipe can emit up to 250 gallons (946 liters) of water a day. Both plastic (PVC) and copper pipes can burst. By taking a few simple precautions, you can save yourself the mess, money and aggravation frozen pipes cause.

Before the cold hits:

Insulate pipes in your home's crawl spaces, garage, unfinished basement and attic. These exposed pipes are most susceptible to freezing. Remember - the more insulation you use, the better protected your pipes will be.

Disconnect garden hoses and, insulate all outdoor faucets (hosebibs). This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

Heat tape or thermostatically-controlled heat cables can be used to wrap pipes. Be sure to use products approved only for the use intended (exterior or interior). Closely follow all manufacturers' installation and operation instructions.

Seal leaks that allow cold air inside near where pipes are located. Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents and pipes. Use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out and the heat in. With severe cold, even a tiny opening can let in enough cold air to cause a pipe to freeze.

When the temperature drops

A trickle of hot and cold water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. Let warm water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall.

Open cabinet doors to allow heat to get to uninsulated pipes under sinks and appliances near exterior walls.



Before you go away

Set the thermostat in your house no lower than 55°F (12°C).

Ask a friend or neighbor to check your house daily to make sure it's warm enough to prevent freezing or

Shut off and drain the water system. Be aware that if you have a fire protection sprinkler system in your house, it will be deactivated when you shut off the water.

If your pipes freeze

Don't take chances. If you turn on your faucets and nothing comes out, leave a faucet turned on for water to drain from and so you can see when the water starts to flow again.

You may be able to thaw a frozen pipe with a hair dryer, heater or heat tape. Apply heat for up to 45 minutes if there is still no water contact the Water Division at 825-7235 or after hours at 643-5775.

If your water pipes have frozen and burst, turn off the water at the main shut-off valve in the house (usually in the basement); leave the water faucets turned on. (Make sure everyone in your family knows where the water shut-off valve is and how to open and close it.) ☺

Never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame. Do not use electrical appliances in areas of standing water because you could be electrocuted.

Babysitters...The right choice

Babysitting is arguably one of the most important jobs a person can ever hold, simply because they are looking after and protecting a family's greatest treasure; their children. It is important that the right babysitter be selected but it is equally important that your expectations (actually your demands) for safety be met each and every time they are watching over your treasures.

Make sure that the babysitter is mature enough for the job, preferably with some experience. It is absolutely acceptable (and encouraged) that when interviewing them, you ask how they would respond to certain household emergencies. A list of references, that you check is also a great way to identify the best person to watch your children. Although some babysitters come with natural talent for the challenges of managing small children, they may not have expertise in certain areas of child management. Classes that the babysitter has completed that will enhance the safety of your children include: babysitter safety course, first-aid and CPR.



- Provide detailed directions, expectations, and a list of important emergency information including: House address, medications that the children are allergic to and names of anyone who is authorized to come into the house.

Winter Parking



Ordinance states, "in order to allow for the orderly and timely removal of snow during winter months, it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the public right-of-way of any street within the corporate limits of Syracuse City at any time during the accumulation or removal of snow unless special permission is granted by the Syracuse Police Department."

City residents are required by ordinance to clear the sidewalks fronting their homes and businesses within 24 hours after a storm. The City appreciates the assistance that Citizens provide in making this snow removal policy work effectively. When clearing driveways and sidewalks of snow, it is unlawful to place or cast any substance into a City street causing a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Snowplow operators make every effort to remove snow as close to the curb line as practical in order to provide mail delivery access to mailboxes, however, the final cleaning of snow adjacent to a mailbox or group of mailboxes is the responsibility of each resident; or group of residents if a community postal box is in service but denied mail delivery due to excessive snow. Following these guidelines will help to make the winter season in Syracuse City safer for both pedestrians and traffic. ♻️

Fire Hydrants & The Snow

The recent snow and continuing cold weather has caused the buildup of snow around some of our Fire Hydrants. This presents a serious problem and we need your help! It is critical that fire hydrants be readily visible and rapidly accessible when we are fighting a fire.

Recently, our fire crews have encountered some hydrants obstructed by snow. Firefighters must frequently find these hydrants in poor weather conditions and in the dark of night.

Take a look at the hydrants in your yard or neighborhood. Are they clearly visible or are they hidden by snow, ice, vehicles, or other debris?

Citizens can help prevent the obstruction of fire hydrants by not piling snow near or around hydrants and by cutting back or removing any dead



vegetation that blocks access to the hydrants. Also, please do not put your garbage can directly in front of the fire hydrant on garbage pickup days. A minimum of 3 feet clear space should be maintained around each hydrant. Doing so will allow firefighters to rapidly locate and access fire hydrants under



emergency conditions.

The Fire Department encourages all residents to help keep hydrants as visible and accessible as possible. If you do spot a hydrant that is becoming obscured with snow please let us know so we can get it cleared.

Thank you for helping us help keep our citizens safe. 🍷

Green Waste

Recycling Program



The City is offering curbside green waste collection services beginning on April 1, 2011. This program is voluntary and those interested in participating must complete an enrollment form, which can be found at City Hall or on the City's website, www.syracuseut.com. Cans must be kept for a minimum of 6 months and there is a maximum of 3 garbage and/or Green Waste cans per household. The cost per can will be \$6.50 per month. Green waste containers may be used for solid waste collection and disposal from December 1 through March 31 each year. Green waste collection will be the same day as your regular garbage day, however, between April 1 and November 30 a different truck will pick up the green waste.

Green waste materials include lawn cuttings, clippings from bushes or shrubs, leaves, garden waste and produce, and other similar green yard waste. PLEASE NOTE: This green waste recycling program does not permit you to place dirt, rocks, sod, food waste, plastic, glass or paper in their green waste recycling containers. 🍷

- Show and tell the babysitter: emergency exits points, fire extinguishers, phones, how to lock doors, location of second story escape ladders, life saving medications and everything they may need to know about your home in the event of an emergency.
- The most important rule...No visitors. You want the babysitter to concentrate on your children so make sure to remind them that they are doing an important job and no one is to come for a visit.
- Provide your emergency contact list that includes at least one other family member or trusted friend.

“Junk” Mail *can be more than just a nuisance*



There are times, if not daily, when we feel that there is more “junk” mail than actual mail! Some of the ads and promotional announcements can easily be recycled; however, there are some items that could put you at risk when you throw them in the recycling or garbage bin. A credit offer with some your personal identification information and an authorization code is a prime target for identity thieves.

To help protect yourself and limit the number of “pre-screened” offers you receive, you can “opt out” through each of the three credit reporting bureaus. Collectively, they have authorized OptOutPrescreen.com to manage the opt-out processing for them. To opt out, go to

www.optoutprescreen.com or you can make your request via phone at 1-888-567-8688.

While its nearly impossible to escape form all other “junk” mail, there is a way to limit the amount you receive. If you contact the Direct Marketing Association, they will send a request to all of their member organizations to remove your name and address from their list. Go to their website at www.dmchoice.org. ☺
