Fireworks Safety

Learning fireworks safety tips can help ensure everyone has a happy and safe summer holiday.

Kids should never play with fireworks. Even Sparklers can be dangerous, since they can reach temperatures of up to 1,800° Fahrenheit (982° Celsius) — hot enough to melt gold.

Never throw or point fireworks at someone, even in jest.

Always have a hose or bucket of water handy.

NEVER use homemade fireworks or illegal explosives; they can kill you! Report illegal explosives to the fire or police department.

No legal fireworks (sold in Utah) should send sparks higher than 15 feet, travel on the ground farther than 10 feet, or go airborne (with the exception of parachutes without a bang or air display), and should not explode.

Legal fireworks may be discharged three days before, on the day of, and three days following:

- (a) July 4
- (b) July 24
- (c) January 1
- (d) the Chinese New Year

Possession or discharge of illegal fireworks is a class B misdemeanor, punishable by a \$1,000 fine and/or 6 months in jail.

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY

While putting up your swimming pool this summer, keep the following safety issues in mind as well as the law concerning them. Any pool capable of containing 24 inches of water or more **MUST** have an approved **building permit**, **MUST** have a 6-foot fence surrounding it, **MUST** have a self-closing and self-locking gate, and **MUST** have a removable ladder. Fun Water Fact

If you covered a football field with 1 foot of water, it would be about 325,851 gallons, or 1 acre-foot. An average quarter-acre lot uses over one acre foot of water every season for landscape irrigation. However, lawns actually require less than half an acre foot to maintain them to the high standards expected.

Indoor Water Conservation Tips

Use water-efficient showerheads. They are inexpensive, easy to install, and save as much as 750 gallons a month.

Turn off the water while brushing your teeth and save 4 gallons per minute. That amounts to 200 gallons a week for a family of four.

Outdoor Water Conservation Tips

Avoid watering when it is windy.

Water dry or brown spots in the lawn with a hand-held hose rather than running the sprinkler system. This will take care of the brown spots while saving thousands of gallons in water and not overwatering the rest of the lawn.

FREE WATER CHECK!

Want a customized irrigation schedule for your landscape? Want to know what type of soil you have and how to make your irrigation system more efficient? Get a free water check and learn how to efficiently water your yard so you can have an attractive landscape while saving water and money!

A water check involves a series of tests performed in your yard to determine the water output of the irrigation system (precipitation rate), the infiltration of water into the soil, and the distribution uniformity (evenness of the water application). A Weber Basin Water employee conducts the irrigation tests and also checks soil type, turf root depth, and sprinkler pressure. The entire process takes about one hour, and the homeowner is left with a customized irrigation schedule and recommendations to improve irrigation.



WHOSE CURB IS IT ANYWAY?

Because property owners are responsible to maintain sidewalk and park strips fronting their lots, many homeowners erroneously assume these improvements are a part of their land. Consequently, they contract with companies or solicit friends with the appropriate tools to cut their curbing when desiring to widen their approaches and driveways without considering the need to contact the City and acquire the appropriate permits to disturb the public rights-of-way.

Curb cuts and sidewalk repairs or replacements require excavation permits from the City prior to removal since these improvements are public property and must meet City standards. The Syracuse City Ordinance requires those making changes to public improvements, such as curbing, approaches, and sidewalks, to provide proof of their State license number, liability insurance, and license-and-permit bonding. Homeowners may not perform this type of work.

Please contact the City Community Development Department prior to contracting any such improvements in order to acquire the required permit approvals.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Vehicle Burglaries

Thieves looking to break into vehicles are always hopeful that their next target will be one owned by someone whose philosophy is "can't happen to me!" Please take time to review the following three steps with your family members to help protect against becoming victim to auto burglary.

1. **Lock it up!** Completely close and lock all doors and windows.
2. **Take it out!** Put every loose item (this includes stereos or face-plates) in the trunk or take it with you.
3. Park in well-lit areas that would be less enticing for burglars.

Know What You Own

It is important, should you become a victim of a crime, to know what you own. Log any valuable items, such as firearms, jewelry, computers, etc., with its brand, model number, and serial number. This information is critical when filing a police report. Take pictures of items that have none of these unique identifiers, and always file a report immediately.

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WASATCH INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

Services include household/hazardous waste drop-off and reuse shed, green waste drop-off and product pick-up area, recycling bins, and regular waste drop-off area. Prices are \$5 per small load (pickup or single-axle trailer) or \$28 per ton for larger loads (double-axle trailer, flat bed, etc.). Clean, green waste is \$5 per small load or \$10 per ton for larger loads. The household/hazardous waste drop-off is free, provided the waste comes from households and quantities do not exceed 20 gallons of any one item. Such waste must be within containers no larger than 5 gallons. Items available in the reuse shed and use of recycle bins are also free.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES SUMMARY

City Council Meeting Summary

The City Council met in work session and business meetings on Tuesday, May 25 and Tuesday, June 8. The detailed minutes of these meetings are located on our website, www.syracuseut.com.

Following is a summary of the meetings:

May 25 Work Session: Review of FY 2010-2011 budget for the Fire Dept. There was much discussion regarding training costs as well as vehicle repair and replacement costs. The Mayor stated she would like for the Council to consider creating a motor pool fund that could be used to pay for new equipment purchases or major equipment repairs in the future. Chief Cottrell reviewed the City's Insurance Standards Organization (ISO) rating and highlighted the improvements that have been made to his Dept. so that the rating might be improved next time the City is assessed. Review of FY 2010-2011 budget for Building Dept. The Council also discussed training costs for this dept. at length. There were also several questions about the code books and materials needed in order for the dept. to be functional. The Director of the Miss Syracuse Pageant attended the meeting and invited all members of the Governing Body and their families to attend the upcoming pageant.

May 25 Business Meeting: Agenda item 4: The Council set a public hearing for June 8 to consider a budget opening in the current Fiscal Year (FY) budget to make adjustments to cover revenue shortfalls. **Agenda item 5:** Public hearing to consider altering the council meeting schedule. One resident spoke in favor, one resident spoke in opposition and one resident expressed concern regarding residents opportunity to make public comments during work sessions and recommended that work session meetings be held in the Council Chambers. Mayor Nagle summarized the proposal and responded to residents' comments. She explained the Planning Commission is considering adopting the same type of meeting schedule, meaning that applicants will not be waiting for extended period of time to receive Council consideration after receiving Planning Commission approval. She added the City has amended many of its processes and that many applications can receive administrative approval rather than being required to go before the Planning Commission and City Council. She added that public comments will be allowed at the extended work session meeting. Mayor Nagle stated that the altered meeting schedule would allow more time in work session meetings to discuss and debate important issues facing the City. CM Clark added that the Council will work to ensure that the public is aware that work session meetings are public meetings and that everyone is welcome. CM Hammond expressed concern about openness and transparency. CM Kimmel stated that he was opposed to the proposed meeting schedule alteration because he feels it will limit the public's access to their elected officials. CM Peterson stated that he felt the only reason that some wanted to continue to

hold two business meetings each month was for the formality that the meetings provide. He stated that he believed that if the altered meeting schedule is adopted citizens will adjust to the new schedule very quickly and they will learn that they are welcome to attend work session meetings no matter where they are held. CM Shingleton stated some residents may be concerned about the proposal because they don't fully understand it. He added that tradition was not a compelling argument to keep things as they are if it is not providing what the city needs. CM Clark, Peterson, and Shingleton voted in favor of altering the meeting schedule while CM Hammond and Kimmel voted in opposition. The altered meeting schedule will be reviewed after a 90-day period to determine if it is working. The Council will begin the altered meeting schedule in July. **Agenda item 6:** Tyler Bodrero was appointed to the Planning Commission with his term expiring July 31, 2010. **Agenda items 7 and 8:** Two applications for different subdivision plat amendments were tabled; the Council will hold public hearings regarding the applications on June 22. **Agenda item 9:** CM Kimmel was appointed to the North Davis Sewer District Board of Trustees. **Agenda item 10:** IT Director TJ Peace provided a report regarding the operations of his department. He also provided a preview of the new City website, which will be public prior to July 1.

June 8 Work Session: Review of FY 2010-2011 budget for the Recreation Dept. FM Amber Fowles stated that it will be necessary to review the budgeting process during the coming year for this dept. due to the fact that some processes being used to reconcile revenues and expenditures were not correct. The Mayor and Council stated it is important to them to know the exact revenues that the Recreation Dept. is generating and whether program participation fees are covering the costs to administer those programs. Review of FY 10-11 budget for the Planning Dept. Mayor Nagle wanted to be sure the Dept. had a sufficient budget to cover engineering costs on City projects. There were questions regarding City code enforcement. Mayor Nagle explained there is a proposal to convert the code enforcement position to a part time position and assign those duties to the Building Dept. which they have stated they could do without additional personnel. The Council discussed recently adopted legislation dealing with the Utah Retirement System (URS) and the practice commonly referred to as "double-dipping". The Council asked the FM for more information and agreed to discuss the issue further during the next work session. The Council reviewed information provided by CM Clark comparing garbage rates charged by other cities in Davis County. CM Clark stated Syracuse City's garbage rates are lower in comparison to other cities and he asked that the rates be reviewed to ensure that the City's costs to administer garbage collection are being covered.

June 8 Business Meeting: Agenda item 4: A public hearing was held to consider a resolution

to open the current FY budget. Finance Manager Fowles stated the City is not increasing expenditures; rather expenditures are being decreased to cover a revenue shortfall. She explained that staff have been diligent in cutting expenses to assist in balancing the budget. No residents spoke during the public hearing. CM Clark noticed that there is a \$33,500 increase in the expenditures for credit card fees and wanted to ensure that the practice of accepting credit cards for City fees is cost neutral. Ms. Fowles explained that the City is saving approximately \$10,000 on personnel costs by allowing credit card payments. She added that staff are working with the credit card processing vendor about lowering rates. She stated the reason the budget increase is necessary is that there was only \$500 budgeted for credit card fees in the current FY budget. The Council voted unanimously to approve the budget opening resolution. **Agenda item 5:** Consideration of an easement agreement to extend a large sewer trunk line on 3700 South. The Council voted unanimously to approve the easement agreement. **Agenda item 6:** Consideration to approve an interlocal agreement with Davis County whereby the County would administer Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to be awarded to cities in the County. Scott Hess, Davis County Planner, presented the agreement to the Council and explained the proposed CDBG application process according to the agreement. Mayor Nagle expressed concerns that the City has no representation on the group that will be responsible for awarding CDBG funding to participating cities. She was also concerned that if the County saw fit they could dictate that a CDBG project be undertaken in any city in the County without buy-in from that city. CM Shingleton expressed concern and explained that the City received CDBG funding to purchase a van but there are so many strings attached that it is hard to use the van. CM Kimmel stated that the types of things that CDBG funds provide for should only be funded by the private market and that it is not proper to use tax payer dollars to pay for some entitled groups to receive benefits. CM Clark argued that if the City does not enter into the agreement they will be competing against all of Davis County and all other counties in the State for CDBG grant funds. He stated that he wants to do what is best for the City and give the City the best opportunity to be awarded grant funding. CM Peterson stated that he felt the agreement would give the City a better chance at being awarded CDBG grant funds. CM Clark and Peterson voted in favor of entering into the agreement. CM Hammond, Kimmel, and Shingleton voted in opposition. The City will not enter into the agreement. **Agenda item 7:** The Council accepted a document including proposed updates to the City's code enforcement regulations for a first reading. **Agenda item 8:** City Recorder Cassie Brown provided a report on the operations of her department and a report on a recent training she attended.

SYRACUSE ROAD PROJECT



GOOD NEWS! Construction on the UDOT Syracuse Road project is nearing completion! Major construction on the roadway should wrap up near the end of July. While there will still be crews in the area completing cleanup items (i.e. sidewalk, stamped concrete park strips, lighting, residential driveways, etc.) for the remainder of the summer, we expect to have all lanes of the newly-widened roadway open to traffic by late July/early August.


