MAYOR'S MESSAGE

I am pleased to announce our Newsletter finds its way back into your mailboxes this month courtesy of SBOSS (Syracuse Business Organization for Strategic Synergy). SBOSS consists of businesses, large and small, committed to our community and our citizens. I understand communication is vital to building a vibrant community and I thank SBOSS for funding the first issue of the newly revised Newsletter.

It is time to get to work on the budget for the upcoming year. Working with our City Administrator, Department Heads and our new Finance Manager, we presented a Fiscal Year 2011 budget for consideration to the city council that is balanced with **NO** tax increases. When I first took office I stressed that government should not be bigger, rather it should be smarter. With that in mind, I asked City staff to look at different ways of

doing things, to think outside the box and look for efficiencies that would increase the level of services we provide to citizens, with-

out increasing costs. That is a pretty tall order given that our employees have experienced deep budget cuts in the past few years. However, I was amazed to see that by empowering our managers, they could create additional savings and identify organizational changes that will help the city devote more resources to economic development. The 2011 budget has a net savings of nearly \$285,000 in personnel costs over the current budget and includes replacing our Community Development Director as

well as hiring an Administrative Assistant.

I am well aware of the construction fatigue plaguing our residents. I too, share

in your misery. However, our businesses are feeling the pain more than anyone. 
Census Takers will visit homes that may not have received the form or simply did not return it.

FIRE DEPARTMENT



Fire Safety and Prevention is everyone's business.

We need your help! May rains, followed by warm weather, caused the rapid growth of weeds and other vegetation around some of our fire hydrants. This presents a serious problem. It is critical that fire hydrants be readily visible and rapidly accessible when we are fighting a fire.

Recently, our fire crews have encountered some hydrants obstructed by landscaping. Although placing landscaping around a fire hydrant may seem harmless, firefighters must frequently find these hydrants in poor weather conditions and in the dark of night.

Landscaping and other obstructions obscure visibility and causes dangerous delays in firefighting operations.

Take a look at the hydrants in your yard or neighborhood. Are they clearly visible? Or, are they hidden by shrubs, vehicles, weeds or other debris?

Citizens can help prevent the obstruction of fire hydrants by not planting near or around hydrants and by cutting back or removing bushes, trees or other vegetation that blocks access to fire hydrants. Also, please do not put your trash cans directly in front of the fire

hydrant on trash pickup days. A minimum of 3' of clear space should be maintained around each hydrant. Doing so will allow firefighters to rapidly locate and access fire hydrants under emergency conditions.

The Fire Department encourages all residents to keep hydrants as visible and accessible as possible. If you do spot a hydrant that is becoming obscured with vegetation, let us know so we can get it cleared.

H²O Conservation Tips

- Adjust watering schedule monthly to match seasonal weather conditions and landscape needs.
- Adjust sprinkler systems to prevent watering concrete or asphalt areas, to prevent water waste.
- Water lawn areas separate from garden and bed areas. Flower beds, trees, shrubs have different H²O requirements. Separating and watering appropriately will save water and plants will be healthier.
- Sweep up yard debris, rather than hosing down areas.
- Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.
- Clean storm drain grates prior to any storms, and remember, "We all live downstream."



2700 S is under construction from the 1000W roundabout to the 2000 W roundabout. The west side of 2700 S is open to traffic up to RC Willey. However, through traffic is *not allowed* through the construction zone. Residents living in the construction zone will continue to have access to their homes. Any vehicles found violating the no through traffic zone may be subject to a fine.

ROADWAY WORK ZONE SAFETY

With road construction season in high gear, drivers across the state can expect to navigate through more construction zones with vulnerable workers in or near the road. Everyone is responsible for roadway work zone safety.

The Utah Safety Council offers these tips for driving safely in roadway work zones:

- **Expect the unexpected** -- Normal speed limits may be reduced, traffic lanes may be changed, and people may be working on or near the road.
- **Slow down** Speeding is a major cause of work zone accidents.
- **Don't tailgate** Keep a safe distance between you and the car ahead of you. The most common crash in a roadway work zone is the rear end collision.
- **Keep your distance** Keep a safe distance between your vehicle and the construction workers and their equipment.

- **Pay attention to the signs** Warning signs are there to help you and other drivers move safely through work zones. Observe all posted signs, especially those in the work zone.
- **Obey road crew flaggers** The Flaggers know what is best for moving traffic safely in the work zone. A flagger has the same authority as a regulatory sign. You **can** be cited for disobeying his/her directions.
- **Stay alert, minimize distractions** Dedicate your full attention to the roadway. Avoid changing radio stations, using your cell phone or any other distractions while driving.
- **Move with traffic flow** Motorists can help maintain traffic flow and posted speeds by merging as soon as possible. Don't drive up to lane closure and then try to quickly merge.
- **Expect delays** Schedule enough time to drive safely. Check radio, TV and websites for traffic info.
- **Be patient, stay calm** Work zone crewmembers are working to improve the road and make your future driving experiences better.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES SUMMARY

APRIL 27 WORK SESSION:

CM Kimmel provided an overview of the Utah League of Cities and Towns Conference, which he attended in St. George. The Council then discussed a proposal to cancel the second business meeting of the month and hold an extended work session in its place. A public hearing was set for May 25 before giving final consideration to the proposal. The Council then discussed appointments and assignments held by elected officials and citizens. At the request of the North Davis Sewer District Board of Trustees, former CM Lurlen Knight had maintained his position on the Board. Councilmember Kimmel found a section of Utah Code that states that only elected officials can hold those positions. Mayor Nagle informed the Council that she would seek legal advice regarding the issue.

APRIL 27 BUSINESS MEETING:

Agenda Item 4: Set public hearing for May 11 to consider allowing the City to sell advertising in the City newsletter. **Agenda Item 5:** Syracuse resident, 9-year old Sophia Watters, was recognized for her service to every veteran currently residing at the George E. Wahlen Ogden Veteran's Home. **Agenda Item 6:** Lurlen Knight provided a report on the operations of the North Davis Sewer District. **Agenda Item 7:** Change order request for the 2700 South roadway reconstruction agreement. The contractor submitted a change order cost of \$403,958.58. The Mayor and Council expressed serious concern about the need and the cost of the change order. There was extensive discussion about why the change order was necessary and why the engineer had not found this problem during the design

phase of the project. Ultimately the Council unanimously approved the change order. **Agenda Item 8:** A public hearing was held to amend the City budget to accommodate the change orders for the 2700 South roadway project. **Agenda Item 9:** A public hearing to consider a request for a \$500 donation from the Syracuse High School graduation party committee. All visitors making public comments, with the exception of one, spoke in favor of approving the school's request. A Clearfield High student who lives in Syracuse asked the City to give the same consideration to Clearfield High. Staff commented that Clearfield High has requested the use of the Syracuse Community Center free of charge, which is equal to a donation of at least \$500. CM Kimmel voted in opposition of the request. The remaining Council members voted to grant the donation request. **Agenda Item 10:** The Council unanimously voted in favor of allowing Lil' Claires, LLC to operate an Italian Ice stand in Founder's Park. **Agenda Item 11:** Approval of Ordinance 10-02 amending the City's Land Use Code, Title 10. The Ordinance provides for several land use applications to be approved administratively, which should streamline the development process in the City for businesses and homeowners. The Ordinance also included the stipulation that payday lending companies only be allowed in industrial zones. CM Kimmel was opposed to this stipulation because the City was discriminating against payday lenders. Mayor Nagle pointed out that the City regulates various other types of businesses, such as taverns, bars, and sexually oriented businesses. CM Kimmel stated those are moral

issues that the Council should be governing. CM Kimmel voted in opposition to the Ordinance while all other Councilmembers voted in favor. **Agenda Item 12:** Approval of the employee benefits contracts for the next fiscal year. **Agenda Item 12:** Kresta Robinson provided the Council with a report on the operations of the Recreation Department, including the schedule for the City's Heritage Days celebration, which will be held June 21-26. A copy of the schedule is available at www.syracuserecreation.com.

MAY 11 WORK SESSION:

The Council discussed and then directed staff to seek a bid to add green waste collection services to the City's current waste collection contract. The Council held a follow-up discussion regarding appointments held by elected officials. Mayor Nagle reported the City's legal counsel had confirmed that only elected officials may hold positions on boards of taxing entities. She also reported that Lurlen Knight had resigned his position on the North Davis Sewer District Board of Trustees and she recommended that CM Peterson be appointed to fill the vacancy. CM Hammond nominated CM Kimmel to be appointed, CM Kimmel nominated himself and CM Shingleton nominated himself. After discussion CM Shingleton withdrew his name. CM Hammond, Kimmel, and Shingleton all stated that the elected official with the longest amount of time remaining in their term in office should be appointed to the position. Mayor Nagle stated that CM Peterson should be appointed because he has shown an interest in the Sewer District, he has proved his dedication to the City, and he completes all

assignments he receives. CM Clark agreed and commented that he would support CM Peterson. The council directed staff to draft a resolution to appoint CM Kimmel to the position. Finance Manager Amber Fowles then provided a status report for the current fiscal year budget. She explained that staff have been very conservative with their expenditures and the only current problem with the budget is lagging sales tax revenues.

May 11 Business Meeting:

Agenda Item 4: A public hearing was set for May 25 to consider a proposal to alter the council meeting schedule. **Agenda Item 5:** Public hearing regarding a resolution that provides for business advertising in the City newsletter. Four residents spoke during the public hearing; two simply asked questions about the proposal; one was in favor of the proposal; one was opposed. CM Kimmel expressed his concerns that the City is competing with private businesses. CM Kimmel voted in opposition, while the remaining Council members all voted in favor of the proposal. **Agenda Item 6:** The Council adopted the tentative fiscal year 2010-2011 budget and set a public hearing for June 22 to consider final adoption of the budget. CM Hammond noted that staff have prepared a balanced budget and no tax increase is being requested. **Agenda Item 7:** Police Chief Brian Wallace provided the Council with a report regarding the operations of his Department. He focused on the various federally funded programs of which his Officers participate.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

PERMIT COSTS EXAMPLE

Based on a basement completion of 1,500 Square feet, an example of permit costs would be:

Construction Valuation 1,500 sqft. X \$6.00 = \$9,000	
Building Permit Fee	\$201
Plan Review	\$80
State Surcharge (1%)	\$2
TOTAL COST	\$283

Actual construction costs may be much higher than this example.

As outlined in the International Residential Code, under state law, permits are required for the completion of any basement area. Some may think completing the basement area without a permit, and the necessary inspections, is “no big deal”, or “permits cost way to much”. As a matter of fact, completing these areas without permits may be turn out to be a larger deal than you may want. Permits and inspections help to alleviate construction failures and protect against safety items such as fire, electrical shock, light and ventilation, and help save on energy costs. Obtaining permits and inspections may also serve as a strong ally in the event of a lawsuit from future property owners. Also note, some insurance companies may not cover non-permitted areas of your home in the case of fire or water damage.

The Fee Schedule is set, by resolution, by the City Council. Fees include all necessary inspections to complete the project. The three main inspections include 4-way rough inspection, insulation inspection, and final/occupancy inspection. Additional inspections may be

necessary to complete your project and are covered by the permit fee.

Permits do not expire if progress is being made. If a project is vacated or stagnant for more than 180 days, it will expire. We complete inspections in phases to ensure your home is safe, at no extra cost.

If a permit is not obtained prior to work being started, the permit fees can be doubled for an investigative fee and possible citations issued.

Doing inspection after the fact, is deemed to be impossible after sheetrock has been applied. At times it may be necessary to do things over in order to en-

sure compliance is met on the structure. Always be sure to contact the Building Department prior to starting any project, not only to protect yourself but to avoid unnecessary corrections. Syracuse City has information available online for obtaining permits, as well as checklists for basement improvements, to aide you through this process.

Doing the right thing up front could be the best investment you will make on your home. You expect the home you buy to be done correctly, so extend the courtesy and make sure the rest of your home is done legitimately for the next owner and for the safety of your family.


