Brody Bovero Begins Work as City Manager



Several years ago, I organized a panel of youth and their religious leaders to discuss leadership principles. One of the questions asked was, "Who, in your opinion, was the greatest leader in the history of the world?" I heard Abraham Lincoln, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Eleanor Roosevelt, Susan B. Anthony, Ronald Reagan and many more. After the panel dispersed, I put my thoughts to this question and, considering modern history since 1776, my answer was George Washington.

George Washington left his home at age 15 and headed west to survey lands in the Ohio valley. By his early twenties, he had military experience and was a recognized leader among men much older. He was very humble and unassuming in his leadership positions. His view on liberty was unwavering, believing that working with England would secure liberty for the colonists. When denied, he was willing to fight for life, liberty, and property, recognizing that those rights come from our creator.

He was well respected and led this country in our fight for freedom. After freedom was secured, George Washington wanted to go home to Mount Vernon. But the call came to lead the Constitutional Convention and he was unanimously elected president of the convention. He only gave one speech at the convention, preferring instead to reach out humbly to each delegate individually. Our Constitution was the result of honest men working under the persistent leadership of George Washington. It is a document that has stood for more than 200 years. In 1789, George Washington was elected President of the United States with 100% of the electoral votes. A man respected by friend and foe, he was hard working, well read, and committed to a cause.

As I interviewed the final two applicants for Syracuse City Manager, I recognized many great leadership qualities in each that would help them be very successful in administering the needs of our city. It was a difficult decision. In the final analysis, it came down to experience working in a city at the administrative level. I am happy to announce that Brody Bovero started as our new City Manager on February 10.

Brody grew up in Washington Terrace and graduated from Bonneville High School. He attended the College of Eastern Utah for a year, fulfilled a mission for his church in Anaheim, California, and graduated from the University of Utah with a degree in Urban Planning. He spent a couple of years working with the Utah League of Cities and Towns and then headed east to work seven years for Upper Merion Township in King of Prussia, Pennsylvania.

For the last four years, he has been the manager for Thornbury Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania. I am impressed that during this time he also received his Masters in Public Administration degree from Villanova University. He has experience that puts Syracuse in excellent hands for the coming years. All of his experience and education in the last 14 years have focused on working with cities to develop proper growth.

Building Department

Building Permits

According to the International Code, Section R105.1 (adopted by the State of Utah and Syracuse City), any owner or authorized agent who intends to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change the occupancy of a building or structure or to erect, **install**, enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert or **replace** any electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system, the installation of which is regulated by this code, or to cause any such work to be done, shall first make application to the building official and obtain the required permit.

Activities that require a building permit before start of construction:

- Basement completions
- Decks attached to homes
- Swimming pools
- Replacing or adding air conditioning, furnaces, water heaters,
- Water features with electrical pumps
- Small sheds with electrical, plumbing, heating
- Hot tubs
- Carports
- This is **NOT** a complete list. Contact the Building Department for more information.



The Building Department has **numerous** outstanding permits that have never had the initial, follow-up or final **required** inspections. Often times, these permits began with a previous owner who forgot or was unable to finish the project and/or have the needed inspection(s).

In the event you do, we will inform you of the needed steps to continue or close out your permit.

Syracuse Museum and Cultural Center


The Syracuse Museum and Cultural Center celebrates and preserves local history of the city of Syracuse and its early citizens. The main building houses extensive collections of personal belongings that came to Utah in the early pioneer days, Syracuse baseball teams, toys, music, clothing, furniture, and family histories.

The Farm and Home building houses items that show the extensive agricultural past of Syracuse when the town was the largest producer of fruit in Davis County in the early 1900s. Dairy production is also emphasized and on display is our claim to fame: the two-headed calf. Also housed in this building is a replica general dry goods store and the town's first fire truck. The Rentmeister Library of Utah history books is nestled between a blacksmith shop and memorabilia from the local soda shop.

The museum is open on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 2—5 pm and is located at 1891 West 1700 South in Syracuse. (801) 825-3633

GOOD THINGS

Syracuse Police Department would like to recognize several officers for their continued service and dedication to the community.

Sergeant Stan Penrod and Sergeant Lance Call have been selected as employees of the month for the City for the month of January. Sergeant Penrod acted heroically in his successful effort to rescue a young boy who had fallen through the ice at Jensen Pond. Sergeant Call was at the park, off duty, and noticed what was happening. When the boy was pulled safely from the freezing water, Sergeant Call removed his own shirt, wrapped it around the boy and held him close to keep him warm. Both of the sergeants will be formally recognized for their actions by the Mayor and City Council at 7:00 p.m. on February 11, 2014.

Officer Colin Handy was selected as employee of the month in September for his life saving efforts. He responded to a medical call and quickly realized the patient was struggling to breathe. Officer Handy performed first aid to include checking for responsiveness, applying a sternal rub, and opening and maintaining the patient's airway. Officer Handy's quick thinking and response were major contributing factors to the patient surviving the ordeal.



Officer Trase Benson was selected to join the North Davis Metro SWAT Team. This collateral assignment requires a large amount of dedication and extra time away from his family. Officer Benson performed well during a rigorous testing process and has already spent many hours training with the team; he will be a great asset to the SWAT Team.

Officer Erin Behm is the Public Information Officer (PIO) for the police department and handles all media relations. In December, Officer Behm attended and completed an advanced PIO course at The Emergency Management Institute, a National Emergency Training Center in Emmitsburg, Maryland. This was an extensive and very intense training program which involves being placed into high stress media related situations for long periods of time. Officer Behm has already used her training and has represented the Department and City in a professional manner.

The actions and dedication of these officers represent the Department's guiding principles of Pride, Accountability, Cooperation, and Excellence.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

SAFETY MESSAGE


Doing laundry is most likely part of your everyday routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? Each year in Syracuse the fire department responds to several incidents involving appliances in our homes. Here are a few simple safety tips identified by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) you can use to help prevent a clothes dryer fire in your home.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.

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- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible *metal* venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice an increase in the time to dry your clothes, clean lint out of your vent pipe or have a duct cleaning service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and not leaking.
- Make sure the correct electrical connections are used.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Don't leave your home with your dryer in operation.



Keeping the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing will help with the airflow to your appliances, and prevent a potential fire or trip hazard. Clothes that have come in contact with flammable substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

Finally, the leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is a failure to clean them. Following the tips listed above will help ensure you don't experience a fire in your clothes dryer.

SPRING CLEAN UP

As spring shortly approaches and with weather changing, let's all do our part to protect our storm water. This can be done by sweeping gutters and cleaning the storm drain grates that may be in front of or near our homes. This will help beautify our city and avert debris and pollutants from entering the storm drain system and traveling downstream.

SECONDARY WATER – CONSERVATION

As snow pack is down we want to remind you to continue in your efforts of water conservation. Weber Basin Water Conservancy District has numerous programs, services and resources available to help improve water efficiency. To learn more, visit www.weberbasin.com.

Irrigation season typically begins the week of April 15th. Updated information can be found on the city website by clicking: Departments; Public Works Info.

Please ensure your system is ready for irrigation season by closing all valves and spigots tightly to avoid flooding your home or property. Now is a great time to install a secondary water shut-off valve and filter, or to clean and/or replace your existing filter. Having your own shut-off valve allows you to maintain your system, without having to wait for a Syracuse City employee to turn off the City owned secondary water valve in the event of a broken pipe. Tampering with any City owned utility is strictly prohibited (ord. 4-6-12). If you have installed a new sprinkler system, and are ready for the water to be turned on, contact Public Works at (801) 825-7235.

Fix-It Request


