City Council Meeting Summary

City Council Meeting Summary

The City Council met in work session and business meetings on February 28, March 14, March 27, March 31, and April 10, 2012. Detailed Council packets containing further information about the presentations that were made to the Council are available on the City's website, www.syracuseut.com. Following is a summary of the meetings:

February 28 Joint City Council/Planning Commission Work Session: Agenda item b. The Council and Planning Commission received a presentation from MGB+A Consulting Firm regarding the findings from their State Road (SR) 193 Study. **Agenda item c.** The Council received a presentation from the Planning Commission regarding proposed updates to the Trails Master Plan. **Agenda item d.** The Council and Planning Commission discussed proposed ordinance updates regarding animal control in the City.


February 28 Special Business Meeting:

Agenda item 4. The Council received presentations from the 14 applicants seeking to be appointed to the vacant Council seat. **Agenda item 5.** The Council adjourned into a Closed Session. **Agenda item 6.** The Council selected Brian Duncan as the successful candidate to be appointed to fill the vacant Council seat. Councilmember Peterson voted in opposition to the appointment. **Agenda item 7.** Brian Duncan was sworn in as a member of the Syracuse City Council. **Agenda item 8.** The Council considered a resolution to appoint a representative to serve as the City's appointee on the Taxing Entity Committee for the Redevelopment Agency of Syracuse City. The position was previously held by past-Councilmember Kimmel. The Council voted to table the resolution to allow for further discussion and consideration. **Agenda item 9.** The Council was asked to authorize the Community and Economic Development Department to pursue EDCUtah's Community Match Grant in relation to marketing match grant and sponsorship match grant applications. Councilmember Lisonbee inquired as to where the grant funding originates. City Planner Andersen explained that the grant funding is provided by Mountain America Credit Union. The Council voted unanimously to authorize the CEDD to pursue EDCUtah's Community Match Grant.

March 14 Work Session: Agenda item b. The Council reviewed a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relative to administrative and development review procedures for conditional use permits. **Agenda item c.** The Council reviewed a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relative to animal control regulations. **Agenda item d.** The Council discussed various committee appointments and positions held by Councilmembers. **Agenda item e.** The Council reviewed a proposed resolution amending the wage scale by reclassifying the position of Deputy Fire Chief to a full time position and making other minor adjustments throughout. **Agenda item f.** The Council discussed the advertisement for a City Planner position. The discussion centered on the fact that the job description for the position was similar to a description for a position that had not been approved by the Council in late 2011. **Agenda item g.** The Council began to review their rules of order and procedure, but decided to table the discussion until a future meeting so that all members could be provided with a copy of the changes being suggested by Councilmember Lisonbee.

March 14 Special Business Meeting:

Agenda item 2. The Council presented the Syracuse City and Wendy's "Award for Excellence" to Hunter Dimick and Takenna Hamblin. **Agenda item 5.** The Council voted unanimously to adopt a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relative to administrative and development review procedures for conditional use permits. **Agenda item 6.** The Council voted to table a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relative to animal control regulations due to concerns regarding the number of animals that can be kept on a property and the language regarding how property owners must control cats kept on their property. Councilmember Peterson suggested that the Council could work through the concerns during the meeting in order to adopt the ordinance and, therefore, he voted in opposition to tabling the ordinance. **Agenda item 7.** The Council considered a resolution to appoint members to various committee positions and assignments. They voted unanimously to adopt the resolution and insert the appointments that had been decided upon during the work session. **Agenda item 8.** The Council voted to table a resolution appointing Councilmember Shingle-



ton to the Wasatch Integrated Waste Management District (WIWMD) Administrative Control Board. Councilmember Peterson voted in opposition to tabling the resolution. **Agenda item 9.** The Council considered a resolution appointing a representative to serve as the City's appointee on the Taxing Entity Committee (TEC) for the Redevelopment Agency (RDA) of Syracuse City. After a lengthy discussion about whether the appointee should be a City employee or a member of the Council, the Council voted unanimously to adopt the resolution appointing Councilmember Lisonbee to the position. **Agenda item 10.** The Council voted unanimously to adopt resolution amending the wage scale by reclassifying the position of Deputy Fire Chief to a full time position and making other minor adjustments throughout. **Agenda item 11.** The Council voted unanimously to adopt an ordinance approving General Plan updates specific to the Trails Master Plan.

March 27 Work Session: Agenda item a. Army Lieutenant Simmons made a request to be on the agenda to provide a presentation to the Council regarding the Army's Community Covenant Program. **Agenda item b.** Local resident Cody Hawkes made a request to be on the agenda to provide a presentation regarding constructing a "Storybook Park" at a local park in Syracuse City. **Agenda item c.** The Council had a discussion with Public Works Director Whiteley regarding the potential submission of an application for water smart grant. Mr. Whiteley explained that if the grant is awarded to the City, the Council must vote to accept it and he did not want to submit an application if the Council was not comfortable with that action. The Council agreed that it would be appropriate for the City to submit the application. **Agenda item d.** The Council discussed a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relative to animal control regulations. **Agenda item e.** The Council discussed the City's appointment to the North Davis Sewer District (NDSD) Board. Councilmember Lisonbee believes that the City's appointment is not valid because a law regarding noticing a mid-term vacancy in the appointment was not advertised by the City when past-Councilmember Kimmel was removed from the position. City Attorney Carlson provided the Council with three options for remedying the current situation, but at the conclusion of the discussion no direction was given to staff regarding how to proceed. **Agenda items f and g.** The Council did not have sufficient time to review these agenda items. **Agenda item h.** The Council had a discussion about scheduling a special joint meeting of the City Council and Planning Commission regarding the potential development near the Syracuse High School. Planning Commission Chair Greg Day explained that the Commission is currently considering items relative to the potential development and it may not be appropriate for them to participate in this type of meeting. Mayor Nagle expressed concerns that the meeting was being scheduled for a night that one Councilmember and several members of staff are not available to attend. Councilmember Lisonbee stated that she would confer with the developer to determine if he would be available to hold the meeting on an alternative date.

March 27 Business Meeting: Agenda item 3. After a lengthy discussion regarding the specifics of the proposed contract, the Council voted unanimously to authorize Mayor Nagle to execute an agreement with Siemens for a street light conversion project. **Agenda item 4.** The Council voted unanimously to accept annexation petition 2012-01 requesting the annexation into Syracuse City 20.56 acres of property located at approximately 3700 South 1500 West. **Agenda item 5.** The

Council voted unanimously to authorize Administration to execute agreement for the 1275 South road improvement project. **Agenda item 6.** The Council voted unanimously to authorize Administration to execute agreement for the 1700 South waterline project phase two. **Agenda item 7.** The Council voted unanimously to authorize the Mayor to execute a settlement agreement for landscape development with the new developer of the Trailside Park subdivision. **Agenda item 8.** The Council voted unanimously to adopt an ordinance amending various provisions of Title 10 of the City Code relating to animal control regulations.

March 31 Special Business Meeting: Agenda item 2. The Council voted unanimously to adopt a resolution amending the City's wage scale by adding the position of Gang Mower Operator – Seasonal.

April 10 Work Session: Agenda item b. The Council reviewed Councilmember Lisonbee's proposed changes to the rules of order and procedure. The decision was made to continue to review the document at the April 24 work session meeting. **Agenda item c.** Finance Director Marshall stated that at the budget retreat held March 31 he did not receive any feedback from the Council regarding any changes they would like to see in the tentative Fiscal Year 2012-2013 budget. He explained that the City is required to present a tentative budget to the Council for acceptance at their first meeting in May, and he would prefer to have time to have continued discussion regarding any feedback the Council has about the information that was presented at the retreat. He asked that the Council forward him a list of the department budgets they would like to review in further detail. **Agenda item d.** The Council reviewed a proposed ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relating to signs. **Agenda item e.** The Council reviewed the draft rewrite of Title Four of the City Code. The Council asked the staff to draft language to add to the document that would allow for appeal opportunities for citizens or developers seeking different application approvals from the City.

April 10 Business Meeting: Agenda item 2. The Council presented the Syracuse City and Wendy's "Award for Excellence" to Connor Clark and Emily Tweed. **Agenda item 3.** The Council presented a proclamation of recognition to the Syracuse Titans Girls Basketball Team for their achievement of being named as 5-A State Champions. **Agenda item 4.** The Council tabled the presentation of a proclamation of recognition to Syracuse Titan Zane Rich as the 5-A 132LB Wrestling State Champion. **Agenda item 7.** Mayor Nagle announced a proclamation declaring May 2012, as "Foster Care Month" in Syracuse City. **Agenda item 8.**

Mayor Nagle announced a proclamation declaring May 2012, as "Military Appreciation Month" in Syracuse City. **Agenda item 9.** The Council unanimously adopted a proclamation declaring April 27, 2012, as Arbor Day in Syracuse City. **Agenda item 10.** The Council voted unanimously to authorize the administration to adjust utility accounts by writing off amounts associated with bankruptcies. **Agenda item 11.** The Council voted unanimously to adopt an ordinance amending various provisions of Title Ten of the City Code relating to signs. **Agenda item 12.** The Council voted unanimously to authorize the administration to execute the Lease Financing Agreement with Zion's Bank for street lighting project and set a public hearing for April 24, 2012 to consider a related budget opening.





Cemetery

That increases the public's ability to find where loved ones are buried, increase accessibility for family history research, and helps to identify the locations of burial positions that are available for purchase. Ordinance Enforcement

Property Maintenance Responsibilities; Sidewalks and Park Strips



It is unlawful for any owner, agent, lessee, and/or occupant of real property abutting and bordering any public street in the City to fail to keep the weeds and grasses within park strips or other adjacent landscaped or open areas within a dedicated public right-of-way from growing taller than 6 inches or to fail to promptly clear and remove the cuttings from the premises in order to prevent them from becoming scattered or blown onto adjacent properties. However, this shall not apply to any ornamental grass so long as it is used and maintained solely, or in combination with any other ornamental grass or grasses, as a supplement to an overall landscaping plan. Additionally, owners, agents, or lessees of undeveloped properties or vacant lots with no buildings or structures must keep the

weeds and grasses from growing taller than 12 inches at all times and must promptly clear and remove the cuttings from the premises as well. Weeds that are roto-tilled or removed by the root must be buried under the soil or removed from the property. Please be sure to edge the park strips sufficiently to prevent any grass or weeds from growing over the curbing.

Late Fee Implemented

In an effort to improve efficiencies within our utility department, we will be implementing a \$10.00 late fee on all accounts that are past due. As the utility bill is due by the 25th of each month, residents will receive a 10-day grace period to allow for payment. The late fee will not be added until the 5th of the following month. Fees began February 5, 2012 on all accounts past due at that time. We believe that this will help to reduce the amount of past due accounts thus reducing time and money spent on collection of these accounts.

The most secure, cost effective way for both residents and Syracuse City is to sign up for the Electronic Funds Transfer. This option is provided at no cost to the resident or the city. All that is needed to participate is the EFT form and a voided check. Forms can be obtained on the city website or at the city offices. Bills can also be paid by cash, check, or money order. We also

Police Beat

Syracuse City Police Saves \$3,000 per Month in Gas

Earlier this year, the Syracuse City Police Department replaced 10 regular gas vehicles with 10 hybrid vehicles. The gas vehicle brands were Ford Crown Victoria, Dodge Charger and Durango, and Chevy Impala. Their years ranged from 2003 to 2006. The new, more fuel efficient hybrid vehicles include 4 Ford Fusions and 6 Ford Escapes. The hybrids are all 2012 year models. The combined savings from the new hybrid vehicles are estimated to be around \$3,000 per month. The City will lease the vehicles, which will reduce maintenance costs.

The police department sold the 10 used vehicles themselves from the department parking lot. This effort resulted in higher purchase offers for each used vehicle. The effort tallied an additional \$21,000 higher for the 10 sold vehicles than if they were to sell the vehicles to a car dealership. We commend the Police Department's efforts to conserve resources when budgets are tight and gas prices are high.

A Message from the Fire Department

Hydrant Flushing Throughout the City

As we transition from winter to spring and summer, the Fire Department would like you to be aware of one of our important maintenance activities. In coordination with Public Works and the Water Department, firefighters will be opening and flowing fire hydrants throughout the city. There are many reasons for this, including insuring the integrity of the fire hydrant hardware (main connection, valves, stem, caps etc) and documentation of the pressures and gallon-per-minute flows the hydrant can provide. We believe our public culinary water system in place is in good shape overall, and that we will have the water capacity needed for a fire-fighting emergency on any given day. Testing the pressures and flows regularly helps identify any problem areas or hardware within the water system.



One of the noticeable side effects of these hydrant flows is a temporary discoloration of the water in the immediate area of the flow. When a hydrant is opened the sediment in the main is stirred up which creates murky water. We will keep the hydrant open until the water flows clear, but you may experience cloudy or murky water from your home business faucet for a few hours following a hydrant flow. Be assured there is nothing wrong with the water, and it will clear in a short time.

We appreciate your support of this important maintenance activity through the summer months. If you know of a specific hydrant that has sustained damage through the winter months, please contact the Fire or Public Works Departments. Be Safe!
