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# City Council Meeting Summary

\*\*\*City Council Meeting Summary\*\*\*

The City Council met in work session and business meetings on Tuesday, March 22 and Tuesday, April 12. The detailed minutes of these meetings are located on our website, [www.syracuseut.com](http://www.syracuseut.com). Following is a summary of the meetings:

**March 22 Work Session: Agenda item b.** The Council received a report from Justice Court Judge Bean regarding recent activities and operations in the Justice Court. He provided each member of the Governing Body with a brief Power Point presentation and advised them to consult with him if they had any additional questions. **Agenda item c.** The Council received a report from the Syracuse Arts Council as well as the Miss Syracuse Committee and Miss Syracuse herself. The reports were regarding budget amounts allotted to each entity and the representatives of both groups explained how their budgets have been appropriated in the past and how they would be used in the coming Fiscal Year running from July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012.

**Agenda item d.** The Council then had a discussion regarding Green Waste Recycling. Roughly 600 households have signed up to participate in the program and the recycling service provider has communicated to the City that it is difficult for his company to honor the rate that he promised to the City and that he will be losing money due to increasing overhead costs, such as fuel prices, etc. The Council discussed options such as an opt-out recycling program or contacting each household individually to invite them to participate in the program. The Council ultimately opted for the latter, but committed that the program will begin April 1 as planned at the rate adopted by the City.

**March 22 Special Meeting: Agenda item 2:** The Council held a public hearing regarding the UDOT proposed routes for the West Davis Corridor and the City's consideration to recommend the addition of an interchange at the intersection of Bluff Road and Gentile Street; Consideration of City's position on West Davis Corridor. They listened to over two hours of public comment and then debated the issue openly. All Councilmembers had concerns about the three routes recommended by UDOT due to the impacts they would have on residents and the City as a whole. The Council referenced a rendering that was presented during the March 8 work session meeting that included three City-drafted routes that were considered as alternatives to UDOT recommended route C (see [www.syracuseut.com](http://www.syracuseut.com)). The Council began referring


to them as C1, C2, and C3. After a lengthy debate the Council unanimously supported a motion that the City support option C3 and that the recommendation be forwarded to UDOT along with City comments. The comments submitted to UDOT are available on the City's website.

**April 12 Work Session: Agenda item b.** A local resident requested time on the work session agenda to address the Council regarding the operation of off-road vehicles on a parcel of ground in his neighborhood. He explained that an adjacent property owner built a dirt track on his property to accommodate dirt bikes and four-wheelers. He explained that this practice is somewhat disturbing to him due to the noise and dust created by the vehicles. He asked that the Council consider adopting an ordinance that would prohibit the operation of off-road vehicles in residential areas.

The Council discussed the issue at length and ultimately determined that they would like for the City to handle the issue utilizing current ordinances and laws rather than create a new law.

Mayor Nagle indicated that the City's Code Enforcement Officer as well as the Police Department will be made aware of the issue so that they can determine if current Code Enforcement Regulations may be employed to prohibit the operation of off-road vehicles in residential areas. Councilmember Clark told the resident that if his issue is not resolved by the course of action explained by the Mayor that he should re-address the Council to finalize a resolution.

**Agenda item c.** The Council then discussed various items of Council business for the remainder of the work session meeting.

**April 12 Business Meeting:**

**Agenda item 4:** The Council considered a resolution to re-appoint Lloyd Waite as the City's representative on the Mosquito Abatement Board. Mayor Nagle explained that the Council had previously decided to appoint a member of the Governing Body to the position, but when that was relayed to the Mosquito Abatement Board they informed the City that Mr. Waite's institutional knowledge would be very difficult to replace and they requested that he be allowed to continue his service. Mayor Nagle further explained that the Mosquito Abatement also committed that they would personally meet with the City Council before requesting any kind of tax increase in the future. She indicated that the Board does not believe they will be seeking a tax increase any time soon. The Council ultimately unanimously approved the resolution to re-appoint Mr. Waite to the Mosquito Abatement Board. **Agenda item 5.** The Council considered a resolution to

appoint Tex Couch as the Syracuse City Building Official. Community Development Director Eggett explained that the City is required by law to assign the title to an employee of the City; the Council ultimately unanimously approved the resolution. **Agenda item 6.** The Council considered a resolution to appoint Kathryn Lukes as the Syracuse City Cemetery Sexton. The position has previously been held by a member of the Governing Body, but City staff requested that the title be reassigned to a full-time employment position in order to improve turn around time of applications submitted by residents to purchase burial plots. The Council ultimately unanimously approved the resolution. **Agenda item 7.** The Council adopted a proclamation declaring April 29, 2011 as Arbor Day in Syracuse City. **Agenda item 8.** The Council considered a resolution to authorize the expenditure of tax increment funds for the reimbursement of costs relating to the installation of public improvements outside the boundary of the 1700 South Street redevelopment project area. Councilmember Kimmel recused himself from participating in the discussion and vote on the resolution due to the fact that he is employed by the entity that is to be reimbursed by the City. The remaining Councilmembers voted unanimously to approve the resolution and then convened as the Redevelopment Agency (RDA) Board to consider a similar resolution, which was also unanimously adopted. ♪

## Syracuse City Contract Unit Post Office



The Syracuse City Contract Postal Unit has been in existence for almost three years. Located in City Hall, the CPU is here to help residents of Syracuse and the surrounding communities with their basic mailing needs. While many of the services offered at main Post Office branches are available at the CPU, we are unable to provide money orders, post office boxes, registered mailing services and any services having to do with the delivery of the mail. The Syracuse CPU is able to help you with your first class mailing needs (including certified, return receipt mailings), parcel post for larger parcels, Priority Mail (including delivery confirmation, signature confirmation and insurance) and Express Mail. We are also able to help you with your international shipping needs.



One of the common myths of the CPU is that we also provide delivery of the mail for Syracuse. All of our mail is still delivered from the main branch located at the Freeport Center. Questions about mail delivery, obtaining keys for your mail box or picking up mail after returning from vacation or after receiving a notice about mail being held in your mail box is all handled by the Freeport Center.

Another common myth is that the Syracuse CPU charges more for their services. The CPU charges exactly what main branches of the Post Office charge. The City receives a percentage of all the sales made in the CPU, so every time you choose to come to our CPU rather than making the drive to a main branch, you are helping to support Syracuse City.

The Syracuse CPU is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. We are not open on Saturdays and City holidays. If you haven't already done so, stop by and see what our CPU is all about! ♪

# Clearfield High

## 50th Anniversary

This year Clearfield High is celebrating its 50th Anniversary year. As an Alumni Association, our goal is to continue to support Clearfield High in educating and training students. In association with the 50th Year Celebration, the Alumni Committee has developed a four-fold program to help students attending Clearfield High reach a higher potential. With your help, each student will have the opportunity to see what other Clearfield High graduates have achieved and tap in on the training, tips and techniques by which they have achieved success.

Clearfield High has Five Focused Areas of Study. These career pathways allow students flexibility to explore a variety of career Fields, they are: Art, Business and Marketing, Health and Human Services, Industry and Letter and Sciences. This four-fold program will be called the "CHS Hall of Fame" and its purpose is to aid the students as they move into their Focused Areas of Study.

There are four aspects to this program:

1. **Hall of Fame Wall:** This is a wall that features alumni who have been nominated because of their achievements in one of the five Areas of Focus. This nominee's picture and biography will be placed on the wall. The first year there will be five nominees, with new one's added each subsequent year. The purpose of this wall is to help students visually see the graduates of Clearfield High who have succeeded in these five areas.
2. **Career Kiosk:** The next feature of the Hall of Fame will be a "Career Kiosk." We cannot possibly put all those who have been successful on the "Hall of Fame Wall." We needed another way to be able to access other alumni's careers and successes. To do this, we will plan on adding a kiosk which has a touch screen computer that will access data from alumni according to their achievements in the Five Areas of Focus. This is another part of the Hall of Fame where we need your support and help. We are asking as many alumni who feel they have had experience in these fields to send in their "Career Form." We will then add their information to the database. Students can then look up a career path from the Focus Areas and find alumni who have succeeded in their chosen Career Path and find how they did it. Also, there will be a place on the enclosed form where you can check the box if you are willing to be a mentor.

## West Davis Corridor

We are now reviewing all comments we received during the February-March comment period one-by-one, analyzing your new ideas, and gathering additional data to help us make appropriate adjustments to the alternatives - these refined alternatives will include shifts in some areas. The refined alternatives will reflect data from public comments submitted to us as well as further study analysis. We will publish these results to our website as "Proposed Alternatives - Refined." ## Animal Control Reminder



**I**s your dog currently licensed and vaccinated? You can vaccinate and license dogs at most Davis County Vets.

Also, please remember that the law requires dogs to be kept on leashes at all times when in public and that owners are ALWAYS responsible to clean up or pick up after their animals when allowed off owners' premises.

## Police Beat

**T**he Utah Attorney General's Office has created a booklet/guide for victims of identity theft. It has clear information on what to do if you are the victim of identity theft. These pamphlets are available at Syracuse Police. This is how IRIS works. Visit [www.idtheft.utah.gov](http://www.idtheft.utah.gov) and login to IRIS to report your identity theft. Step-by-step instructions walk you through the ID theft resolution and reporting process. They also guide you through setting up a 90 day or 7 year Fraud Alert to help protect you from additional identity theft crimes.

A Utah Attorney General's incident number is issued to your report. Each incident number is used to track updates and information regarding the status of the report. The incident number is also applied to a printable affidavit and ID theft report.

Based on crime location of occurrence, IRIS identifies the police department with jurisdiction over investigating each crime. The identity theft report is automatically delivered to that department.

A responding investigating officer verifies your report, issues a case number and provides agency's contact information.

Case numbers issued by law enforcement go directly to your secure IRIS account. Victims are provided a printable ID theft Report and Affidavit that may be used to help clear your name and credit history.

### Steps to clear ID Theft:

- 1) Organize your case
- 2) Contact all financial institutions and creditors
- 3) Initiate a Fraud Alert or Credit Freeze
- 4) Contact Police or file a report on IRIS
- 5) Review your Credit Report



**B**eginning in May, City residents will see a changes in their utility bill. Currently, each customer receives a postcard bill each month, this will be replaced by a new 8 1/2 x 11 statement. The City utility bill pays for a number of services such as the supply and delivery of water to your home and business, secondary water, sewer, and waste collection services.

The City is making the changes for several reasons. First and foremost, the new process will be outsourced, resulting in cost savings. The new bills will also include more information about customer accounts such as water usage that could not be included in the postcards. In addition, the new bills will be in envelopes, so private information like account balances will be concealed. 
