## Mayor's Message

As I end my tenure as Mayor, I am excited. While the tendency in politics today is to focus on what's wrong with the City, the truth is, the City has had a very successful four years. In 2009, working with the Council and City staff, we identified three distinct strategic goals: Improve the infrastructure, attain fiscal sustainability, and promote economic development. We have achieved significant milestones with each priority. What the City has accomplished should be a source of great pride for our community.

In 2009 we started the year with a rainy day fund of 5%, today, we are at nearly 20% of our general fund. In 2009 we had budgeted only \$78k to infrastructure improvements in the City. In 2013 alone we invested nearly \$7 Million dollars improving roads, water and sewer lines. In 2009 we had nearly a \$1 Million dollar deficit in our park funds. Today, we are in the black, we completed a new park in Tuscany Meadows and we are set to break ground on a one of a kind park in our Town Center; Chloe's Sunshine Playground. This is remarkable when you consider this was done without a tax or fee increase by the City.

With the Ninigret development over by the high school, we are working mightily to answer the calls of our struggling businesses to bring in a daytime population that will help their businesses thrive. The Ninigret group has the potential of bringing in over 1000 jobs into our City. This will do so much to help our Town Center and our tax base going forward. The first business, US Cold Storage is set to open in 2014, in that development and we are excited to welcome them to our City. One of the most common complaints I have heard as Mayor is the lack of sit down restaurants in our City. By bringing a daytime population to the City, restaurants will be able to locate here. It is extremely difficult for a business owner to thrive when their business model only has customers from 6:00-9:00 in the evenings.

The City has done a wonderful job in the face of serious economic struggles. Going forward, the single best thing we can do to ensure continued success is encourage a robust economy within our City. We can create an environmentally sound and economically sustainable place and still manage to maintain our small-town community. We just need the will to do so. Often we bicker over the small stuff, not realizing how much it is costing us on the big picture. Change is uncomfortable, but the status quo is crippling.

I leave office knowing that our residents are well cared for by a remarkable City staff. These men and women give so much to ensure the quality of our lives each and every day. They are our best asset. I thank them for their commitment to excellence and their willingness to be bold, courageous and visionary. I will miss working with such remarkable people.

Finally, I thank you for the honor of serving as Mayor. It has been an exciting and humbling experience. As we come upon the holiday season, my wish is for all of you to have the Merriest of Christmases and the Happiest of New Years.

## Police Department

Syracuse Police Department wants to make the public aware of scams occurring within our community:

- A popular scam involves a popular and local online classifieds website. The buyer will send the seller a check in the mail for more money than what the seller is asking. The buyer will request the seller send them back the difference. The checks that are being used look very real. Once the seller's bank learns that the checks are fraudulent, the seller is left to deal with the financial ramifications.
- The second scam involves and gives the appearance that you are being investigated by the FBI. Your entire screen will freeze and a very official looking FBI logo will appear. It will indicate you that you have been involved in child pornography, fraud, or other illegal activity. The message will tell you that you must pay a large fee to have the computer unlocked. This is actually a virus that has been placed on your computer through your IP address; you will need to take your computer to a repair and service provider to be fixed.
- The third scam involves people being contacted by someone posing as a DEA agent. The recipient will be told they are under investigation for abusing prescription medications and that they have to send a large amount of money to stop the investigation.



Third, it is ok to be suspicious and to ask questions. Finally, never share personal identifying information or send money to callers, emails, or websites that you do not recognize or that you did not contact.

## Public Works



### Snow Plow Safety

Snow plow safety is something everyone on or near roadways should be aware of. Operators performing this necessary function are dedicated to providing safe roads for the traveling public. Please be cautious as you commute this winter. Help others during this winter season with your time and equipment to assist the elderly, disabled, a neighbor or friend. We all need a little assistance now and then.

**PROHIBITED ACTS.** It shall be unlawful for any person to destroy, deface, or in any manner injure any public street or sidewalk. It shall be unlawful for any person intentionally or carelessly to throw, cast, or put into, drop, or leave in any street, gutter, sidewalk, or public place any stones, gravel, sand, coal, dirt, manure, garbage, leaves, lawn or hedge clippings, rubbish of any kind, snow, or any other substance. (Ord. 4-1-160)

**OFF-STREET PARKING DURING WINTER MONTHS.** In order to allow for the orderly and timely removal of snow during winter months, it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the public right-of-way of any street within the corporate limits of Syracuse City at any time during the accumulation or removal of snow unless special permission is granted by the Syracuse Police Department. Violation of this ordinance shall be a Class C misdemeanor, punishable in accordance with all the provisions of law. (Ord. 11-4-1)

## Tree Trimming

Trees provide shade and appeal to our city and we welcome trees that provide such benefits. As with many things, these trees require maintenance for good health to the trees and others around them. In order to protect trees that extend over the sidewalks and roadways from being damaged by vehicles and pedestrians, trees must be pruned to allow a clearance of seven feet over a sidewalk and eleven feet over a street. This clearance not only allows service vehicles such as garbage trucks, mail delivery, and street maintenance full unobstructed access, but also increases visibility to traffic signs and street lamps. Our Ordinance 10-6-070 (j) describes this maintenance requirement in greater detail.



## Utilities

As the close of the summer season approaches, there are just a few reminders that we wanted to bring to your attention:



- October is the last month that we will read meters for the season. The bill that you receive in November will reflect this final read. Meters will be read again beginning in April of 2013.
- Between the months of November through March, residents are charged \$16.50 for water. The May 2013 bill will reflect charges for any water that is used over 8,000 gallons each month.
- Secondary water is turned off in October however the secondary water charge is a flat rate year round charge so that we may avoid rate increases in the summer months.

Our green waste season will continue through November 30th and resume again April 1, 2014. During the months of December-March you may use your green can for regular household waste.

## West Davis Corridor


- In June, UDOT held a series of three open houses and public hearings for the public to review the Draft EIS information and submit comments. More than 800 people were in attendance at these events. The official public comment period closed on August 23rd. During the public comment period, the public was encouraged to review the contents of the Draft EIS and submit their formal comments to the study team for consideration.

- The Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is available electronically for review on the Documentation page of the study website: [www.udot.utah.gov/westdavis](http://www.udot.utah.gov/westdavis). A hard copy of the Draft EIS is also available at various city buildings and libraries throughout Davis and Weber counties. The Draft EIS is a large report, documenting all the data, information, input and analysis the team has collected and studied for the past three years of the study. The Draft EIS also identifies UDOT's locally preferred alternative, which is a recommendation based on all the data reported thus far.
- All public comments will be reviewed and formally responded to in the Final EIS document, which is expected to be released in winter 2013. This will be followed by a Record of Decision from Federal Highway Administration in spring 2014.

# Frozen Water Pipe Prevention

The winter months mean freezing outdoor temperatures which can cause water lines to freeze. Frozen pipes can burst and cause extensive water damage. An eighth-inch (three millimeter) crack in a pipe can emit up to 250 gallons (946 liters) of water a day. Both plastic (PVC) and copper pipes can burst. By taking a few simple precautions, you can save yourself the mess, money and aggravation frozen pipes cause.



## Before the cold hits

- **Insulate** pipes in your home's crawl spaces, garage, unfinished basement and attic. These exposed pipes are most susceptible to freezing. Remember, the more insulation you use, the better protected your pipes will be.
- **Disconnect** garden hoses and insulate all outdoor faucets (hosebibs). This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.
- **Heat tape** or thermostatically-controlled heat cables can be used to wrap pipes. Be sure to use products approved only for the use intended (exterior or interior). Closely follow all manufacturers' installation and operation instructions.
- **Seal** leaks that allow cold air inside near where pipes are located. Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents and pipes. Use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out and the heat in. With severe cold, even a tiny opening can let in enough cold air to cause a pipe to freeze.

## When the temperature drops

- **A trickle** of hot and cold water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. Let warm water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall.
- **Open** cabinet doors to allow heat to get to uninsulated pipes under sinks and appliances near exterior walls.

## Before you go away

- **Set** the thermostat in your house no lower than 55°F (12°C).
- **Ask** a friend or neighbor to check your house daily to make sure it's warm enough to prevent freezing or
- **Shut off** and drain the water system. Be aware that if you have a fire protection sprinkler system in your house, it will be deactivated when you shut off the water.

## If your pipes freeze

**Don't take chances.** If you turn on your faucets and nothing comes out, leave a faucet turned on for water to drain from and so you can see when the water starts to flow again. You may be able to thaw a frozen pipe with a hair dryer, heater or heat tape. Apply heat for up to 45 minutes if there is still no water contact the Water Division at 801-825-7235 or after hours at 801-643-5775.

If your water pipes have frozen and burst, turn off the water at the main shut-off valve in the house (usually in the basement); leave the water faucets turned on. (Make sure everyone in your family knows where the water shut-off valve is and how to open and close it.)

**\*\*\*Never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame. Do not use electrical appliances in areas of standing water because you could be electrocuted.\*\*\***

# Syracuse Fire Department

## Winter Safety Message

### Some Winter Season Fire Safety Tips...

There may be many reasons people use alternate or auxiliary heating sources for their homes or outbuildings. The use of wood burning stoves has grown and space heaters are very popular in many applications. These are acceptable heating methods under the right circumstances, but they also may become a contributing factor to residential structure fires. The following fire safety tips can help you maintain a safe home environment and not become a fire statistic.

#### Kerosene or Fuel-Oil Heaters

Be sure your heater is in good working condition. Inspect exhaust parts for carbon buildup. Be sure the heater has an emergency shut off in case the heater is tipped over. Never use fuel burning appliances without proper room venting. Burning fuel (diesel fuel or kerosene or propane, for example) can produce deadly fumes. Keep kerosene, or other flammable liquids stored in approved metal containers, in well ventilated storage areas, outside of the house.

#### Wood Stoves and Fireplaces

Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned if necessary, especially if it has not been used for some time. Do not use flammable liquids to start or accelerate any fire. Don't use excessive amounts of paper to build roaring fires in fireplaces. It is possible to ignite creosote in the chimney by overbuilding the fire. Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide. If synthetic logs are used, follow the directions on the package. NEVER break a synthetic log apart to quicken the fire or use more than one log at a time. They often burn unevenly, releasing higher levels of carbon monoxide. One of the common causes of house fires in the winter is hot ashes left in or too close to flammable materials. Never discard hot ashes inside or near the home. Place them in a metal container outside and well away from the house.

#### Electric Heaters

If you use an electric heater, be sure not to overload the circuit. To be safe, never use an extension cord with an electric space heater. Avoid using electrical space heaters in bathrooms or other areas where they may come in contact with water or linens, bedding or clothing that may catch fire.

#### Finally...

If there is a fire hydrant near your home you can assist the fire department by keeping the hydrant clear of snow so in the event it is needed, it can be located. Please contact us at the **Fire Department at 801-614-9614** if you have a home fire safety question.
