
### The Benefits of Shopping in Syracuse this Holiday Season

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## City Council Meeting Summary

The City Council met in work session and business meetings on Tuesday, September 28 and Tuesday, October 12. Following is a summary of the meetings:

**September 28 Work Session:** The Council received information from the Lion's Club regarding the great service they provide to the community. Lion's Club President James Taylor reported that the two most visible contributions the Club has made to the community are the clock tower located in the roundabout near City Hall and the funding for the Museum. He also pointed out that the Lion's Club donated park benches to the City to be installed in Centennial Park. He stated that the City will have the continued support of the Lion's Club and he urged members of the Council to become active in the Lion's Club. The Council then reviewed a proposed ordinance drafted to define the relationship between the City and the Museum and Cultural Center Board. CM Hammond stated that he had reviewed the proposed ordinance with the Board and they requested that some minor amendments be made. After reviewing the recommendations from the Board the Council directed staff to add the ordinance to the next business meeting agenda for final consideration. The Council then reviewed the proposed rewrite of Title One of the Syracuse City Code. Several chapters of the title were reviewed with clarifications and recommendations made throughout. The Council committed to continue to review the document at their next extended work session meeting. Resident TJ Jensen expressed his concern that the citizens of Syracuse may not understand the importance of the process the Council is involved in to rewrite various titles of the City Code. Mayor Nagle stated that she would encourage residents to become involved in the process by attending meetings or asking questions of their elected officials. The Council then had a discussion regarding a proposed ordinance that would prohibit the sale of "spice" chemical compounds in Syracuse City. Police Chief Wallace was present to explain the intent of the ordinance is to deter the use of "spice" in Syracuse.

**October 12 Work Session:** The Council re-

ceived a report from Planning Commissioners and Councilmembers that were given the opportunity to attend the Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) Annual Convention held in September. The overall consensus was that the convention was not as beneficial to the City as it had been in the past. CM Kimmel reported that he attended a session regarding foreclosures in Utah and he recommended that the information that was distributed during the session be added to the City's website as it may be beneficial to Syracuse City residents that may be facing foreclosure. Mayor Nagle stated she liked that idea and asked that staff add the information to the City website. The Council then had a discussion regarding their current meeting schedule. The Council meets during a work session and business meeting on the second Tuesday of the month and then again in an extended work session on the fourth Tuesday of the month. Mayor Nagle recommended that the Council also meet in work session meetings on the first and third Tuesdays of the month while they are engaged through the process of rewriting and recodifying the City Code. After a short discussion the Council determined it will not be necessary to hold additional work session meetings and that if additional discussion regarding the rewrite of the Code is necessary they will meet for longer periods of time during their currently scheduled extended work sessions.

**October 12 Business Meeting: Agenda item 3:** The Council held a public hearing to consider amending the consolidated fee schedule by adding a fee that will be charged to residents that are interested in appealing any code enforcement action taken against them. There were also other minor changes to the fee schedule, which included including fees that had been erroneously omitted from the document after the most recent Council consideration of the fee schedule. The Council ultimately approved the resolution adopting the amended fee schedule. **Agenda Item 4:** The Council held a public hearing to consider an ordinance amending Title 10 of the City Code by amending the political sign provisions. The Council adopted the ordinance, meaning that private property owners can locate political signs on their

property at any time; the previous regulation that political signs could not be erected more than 60 days prior to an election was abolished. **Agenda Item 5:** The Council held a public hearing to consider an ordinance amending the City's Code Enforcement regulations. The regulations were updated in August 2010 and staff has since found some errors that needed to be corrected. Community Development Director Eggett reviewed the necessary changes for the Council's consideration. CM Kimmel voiced his opposition to all Code Enforcement regulations on the basis that he does not believe it is the role of government to tell citizens the manner in which their property must be maintained. The Council ultimately approved the ordinance, with CM Kimmel voting in opposition. **Agenda Item 6:** The Council considered an ordinance that would define the relationship between the City and the Museum and Cultural Center Board. Mayor Nagle commented that the process to define the relationship has been occurring over the past couple of years and she was pleased that the City and the Board have finally reached a resolution. CM Hammond agreed and thanked the Council for their consideration of the ordinance. The Council approved the ordinance, though CM Kimmel voted in opposition based on the fact that he believes that the Museum should be managed independent of the City and that it is not the role of government to provide arts opportunities to the citizens.

### Thank you for your Service

We would like to thank Rodger Worthen for his service to the City of Syracuse. Rodger started with the City as a planner in the late 1990s and worked in that position during an amazing period of growth. In 2007, Rodger became the City Administrator. Rodger had a passion for planning and he helped guide the City as it grew from a small town to one of the largest cities in Davis County. Rodger has accepted a job as City Manager for South Weber. We wish him the best in his future endeavors and thank him for all of his service to our City.

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### Code Enforcement

During winter months, all vehicles must be parked off the street during snow storms to aid the Public Works Department in snow removal. City Ordinance 11-4-1 states, in order for the orderly and timely removal of snow during winter months, it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the public right-of-way of any street within the corporate limits of Syracuse City at any time during the accumulation or removal of snow unless special permission is granted by the Syracuse Police Department.

It is unlawful to blow, shovel, or plow snow from private property onto a public street or right of way causing a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Ensuring City plows are able to clear the roads in a timely and efficient manner, will help to make the winter season safer. We appreciate your help in this matter, and look forward to a safe winter season.





## A Month We Can't Forget

It has been estimated that one in four women will be victims of domestic abuse (domestic violence) in their lifetimes. To combat this crime and bring attention to the abuse, the national Domestic Violence Awareness Month was established and observed in October.

Many victims of domestic violence remain silent through weeks, months and years of needless suffering and pain. While some do take the first steps in seeking help by calling upon law enforcement or other resources, they become sidetracked with their abuser's pleas for forgiveness and false promises. Many people may not realize that men are also victims of domestic violence and can be even more "silent" as victims, refusing to report incidents of violence. Estimates of men who are victims range from 100,000 to nearly 6 million cases a year in the United States. Violence against men and women by their intimate partner is unacceptable, unlawful and must be stopped.

Combating domestic violence begins with knowing, accepting and understanding that **NO ONE** deserves to be abused. In some cases, the abuser will attempt to put the victim in a position of guilt, blaming the

victim for their abuse or promising that it won't happen again. In far too many cases, the first violent act is just the beginning and professional help is needed.

- If you are aware of an in-progress incident of violence, please call 9-1-1 immediately.
- If you are in a relationship that is building in tension that you believe will lead to violent acts or mental or physical abuse, get help by contacting a resource. (see information below.)
- If you're in a situation where it's occurring, do your best to get out and get away for your own safety. Many times this means leaving the abuser for a period of time or even permanently separating yourself from them. If you do leave, be sure not to go where they would expect you to go and make sure to change all of your contact information and access codes (such as email accounts, financial systems and voicemails) so they can't track your location.
- Remember that there can be other, less obvious victims on domestic violence. Children listening from their bedrooms as one of their parents is abused will be profoundly affected.
- Get help by requesting a restraining or protective order against your abuser so that they legally must stay away from you and violations can result in arrest.

**DON'T TAKE IT!!!** If you are the victim of violence, report the crime to us so that we may evaluate the situation and determine the most appropriate response. **SEEK HELP!!!** There are organizations that provide assistance for victims of domestic violence. Contact us or the National Domestic Violence Hotline listed below. **DON'T BE FOOLED!!!** In some cases, the pleas for forgiveness are sincere, but in others, they are just a "timeout" until the next incident. Use caution in reconciliation and seek professional assistance.

Stopping the cycle of violence involves not only the victim, but in many cases the assistance of law enforcement, the courts, counselors, advisors, and advocates. If you are a victim or you may believe you will be one, act now.

### **\*Building Department Notice\***

As of October 1, Syracuse City requires that all Building Permit Application submittals be accompanied by a **plan check deposit**. This deposit will be **applied** to the permit total at time of payment. Payment can be made by check, cash, money order or credit card (Visa or Mastercard). (Credit cards incur a 1% fee charge for recouping the cost of credit card transactions.)

Plan Check fees:

- Single family dwellings- \$500
- Commercial- 60% of the building fees (based on project valuation)
- Other- \$50 (basements, sheds, additions, in-ground pools)

Exceptions: Over the counter permit issuance with a one-time inspection charge. (Water heaters, furnace, air conditioner, power meter change-outs...)
