Syracuse City Friend of the Community Award

The late Charlie Black of Black Island Farms has been selected to receive the Syracuse City Friend of the Community Business Award. His family will receive the award in his honor at the September 10th City Council meeting at 7pm. The award is given to a Syracuse area business that has proven to be a friend of the community through social responsibility, philanthropic actions, and commitment to the community. Charlie has truly been a friend of Syracuse City and he will be greatly missed.

Charlie Black was involved in a tragic automobile accident on July 6th that took his life unexpectedly. Charlie's obituary reads, "Charlie loved his wife of 44 years and his family more than anything. He enjoyed spending all of his free time with them, camping, playing ball, shooting, and telling stories... he was the owner and master mind behind Black Island Farms. He was passionate about preserving the farming community and passing down his knowledge to future generations. He was known as 'King of the Bottomlands'."

Black Island Farms is located on the southwestern edge of Syracuse at 3000 West and Gentile. The 260 acre farm grows grain, corn, pumpkins, squash, gourds, carrots, and cabbage. Animals on the farm include donkeys, cows, sheep, goats, turkeys, geese, ducks, peacocks, and chickens. One chicken named Carlos likes to hang out around the farm office and is popular with visitors and workers. The farm hires about 10 employees during the summer to tend the crops and care for the animals. In addition to the traditional farming practices, they have a burgeoning agri-tainment business. Agri-tainment is the combination of the two words agriculture and entertainment.

Each year the farm holds a Harvest Festival that features a corn maze, haunted house, petting zoo, pumpkin picking, and hay rides to name a few of the fun activities. During the festival, many local schools hold field trips where the kids learn about farming and also have tons of fun in the process. During the fieldtrips, the children would always look forward to saying hello to *Farmer Charlie*. Employment on the farm balloons to around 120 during the festival where staff members help with things like the corn maze, directing traffic, and dressing up for the haunted house. It is estimated that around 60,000 people visit the Festival each year.

Over the years, Charlie has positively impacted thousands of Syracuse residents as they visited him on his farm on school fieldtrips,

or worked for him during the summer. Charlie taught the value of hard work and at age 75 could still outwork many of the teenagers working on the farm. He loved to tease and joke with them but would also give honest feedback and teach them life lessons when the opportunity arose.

Black Island Farms has served the community in numerous ways. Each fall, they donate thousands of pumpkins for the Syracuse Pumpkin Walk. Without the contribution, this popular annual city event would not be possible. They also help with the children's parade during the city's Heritage Days. They donate the train that is a big hit during the event. The Farm also donates to Utah Catholic Community Services where a community kitchen, daycare, school, and young mother assistance is available. In 2000 the farm granted 40 acres as a conservation easement to the Nature Conservancy which will preserve that land from development in perpetuity. Charlie used to say he wants to "grow vegetables, not houses."

This upcoming year's motto for the farm is "The Legacy Continues". Charlie's daughter Dorathy Law, son-in-law Brandon Law, and grandson Tilar Law are keeping his dream alive by continuing the farms operations. You can say hello to them this fall during the Harvest Festival. The festival will be held September 21 to October 31st. For questions about the festival, call the farm hotline (801) 744-6293.

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


Syracuse Police Department is planning its 3rd Annual "5K-9 Fun Run/Walk" to support the Police K-9 program in our community.







Fall is almost here! That means it's almost time for Fire Prevention Week. The theme for this year is "Prevent Kitchen Fires." The Syracuse Fire Department will be hosting an open house for Fire Prevention Week on **Thursday October 10th from 6 to 8 p.m.** at our fire station located at 1869 South 3000 West. In conjunction with this year's theme we will have activities that focus on how to protect your family from fire by planning ahead and integrating simple things into your everyday life that will help keep you safe.

Fires in the home take a great toll on life and property each year. Did you know that two out of every five home fires start in the kitchen? And, unattended cooking was a factor in 34% of reported home cooking fires? Cooking is the leading cause home fires and home fire injuries, followed by heating equipment. Smoking is a leading cause of civilian home fire deaths.

Installing systems such as smoke alarms and residential fire sprinklers, as well as identifying potential hazards, can reduce the risk of home fires and property loss, injury, or death due to fire. Nearly two-thirds of home structure fire deaths occur in homes where there was no smoke alarm, or where smoke alarms were present but failed to operate.

Each year we experience many incidents for false alarms from smoke or carbon-monoxide (CO) alarms. These safety devices have a life expectation of between 5 and 10 years and are subject to failure like any electronic device. However, when smoke or CO alarms fail to operate, it is usually because batteries (or power) are disconnected, missing or dead. If your alarms are 10 years old or older we recommend you replace them to ensure they will respond properly in an emergency. Regular maintenance and testing of your safety alarms for your home is best practice.

You can visit the Fire Prevention Week website, www.firepreventionweek.org, for safety tips, statistical information, and more.

Finally a quick reminder from us that your fire department is ready to serve you 24 hours a day 365 days a year. We are staffed around the clock by highly trained full-time and part-time firefighter/EMTs. We provide a wide range of services from fighting fires and emergency medical calls to hazardous materials incidents, ice rescues and wildfires. We also teach CERT, Teen CERT, CPR and juvenile firesetter prevention classes. Secondary Water Conservation

The efforts being made to conserve water have been helpful. We appreciate those that have been vigilant in following the voluntary watering schedule this season. We must continue these efforts through the remainder of the irrigation season. As our irrigation season ends October 1st, sprinkler systems can be prepared for winter. With water being a precious resource, we are hopeful that this winter will recharge our upstream reservoirs to provide us greater storage and supply for next year.

Storm Water

Did you know that one of the best and simple ways to improve curb appeal to your home is by removing the overgrowth, sediment, and debris that collects in the curb and gutter over time? Doing so, not only enhances the appeal of your home making it attractive, but also helps to keep our storm water clean before entering the pipes and ditches that empty into our Great Salt Lake. A clean gutter also improves water flow and prevents water-ponding that often times leads to moss growth during hot conditions. Clean gutters also help to reduce deterioration that occurs to our roads, thereby helping to extend the life of our roads. Incorporating this simple practice into our routine yard maintenance will help to make our city a more attractive, clean, efficient and healthy place to live!

Tree Trimming

Trees provide shade and appeal to our city and we welcome trees that provide such benefits. As with many things, these trees require maintenance for good health to the trees and others around them. In order to protect trees that extend over the sidewalks and roadways from being damaged by vehicles and pedestrians, trees must be pruned to allow a clearance of seven feet over a sidewalk and eleven feet over a street. This clearance not only allows service vehicles such as garbage trucks, mail delivery, and street maintenance full unobstructed access, but also increases visibility to traffic signs and street lamps. Our Ordinance 10-6-070 (J) describes this maintenance requirement in greater detail.


SR-193 Extension


CENTER ST TO MAIN ST

Phase 1 Progress




2000 W TO CENTER ST

Phase 2 Progress





MAIN ST TO DEPOT

In June, UDOT held a series of three open houses and public hearings for the public to review the Draft EIS information and submit comments. More than 800 people were in attendance at these events. The official public comment period closed on August 23rd. During the public comment period, the public was encouraged to review the contents of the Draft EIS and submit their formal comments to the study team for consideration.

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is available electronically for review on the Documentation page of the study website: www.udot.utah.gov/westdavis. A hard copy of the Draft EIS is also available at various city buildings and libraries throughout Davis and Weber counties. The Draft EIS is a large report, documenting all the data, information, input and analysis the team has collected and studied for the past three years of the study. The Draft EIS also identifies UDOT's locally preferred alternative, which is a recommendation based on all the data reported thus far.

All public comments will be reviewed and formally responded to in the Final EIS document, which is expected to be released in winter 2013. This will be followed by a Record of Decision from Federal Highway Administration in spring 2014.
