## A Report to Our Citizens 2014-2015

### MISSION STATEMENT

To provide quality, affordable services for its citizens, while promoting community pride, fostering economic development, and preparing for the future.



### Syracuse City Public Safety

Did you know that Syracuse City has its own police and fire department? 2015 marked Syracuse fire departments 50th anniversary and Syracuse police departments 65th anniversary. The City pays for these services with property tax and sales tax paid by our residents.

Prior to 1965, our fire protection services were contracted through Davis County and Clearfield City. In 1965, Syracuse and West Point worked together to start a volunteer fire department that would service both cities. Volunteers were trained by the state Fire Marshall.

Keith West was selected as the first fire chief and served for a short time until the end of 1965. Roy Miya was appointed by the Syracuse City Council as the second fire chief. He served for 19 years and helped the department establish its roots. He was paid a salary of \$25 per month. The other volunteer firefighters were paid \$2 for each meeting they attended and \$2-3 per hour for any fires they fought.

In 2002, Syracuse City purchased two ambulances and began providing ambulance services to its residents. Syracuse City transitioned to a full-time fire department in August 2002. Today, our fire department is staffed 24 hours a day 7 days a week by a minimum of 3 full-time firefighters and 1 part-time firefighters.

Prior to 1950, all law enforcement services were contacted through the Sheriff's office in Davis County. On March 1, 1950, Elvin Hansen was sworn in as the first Syracuse Town Marshall. He received pay of \$5.00 per month plus expenses. He had no equipment with the exception of a revolver and handcuffs that were on loan from the Sheriff's office.

In 1971, Henry Martin became the 3rd Town Marshall and his title was changed to Chief of Police. He received a police car, radio, radar, and a small office in city hall. In 1977, two additional police officers were added to the force. Today, we have 20 police officers including the Chief of Police.

## 2015 Highlights

- Chloe's Sunshine Park was completed with a grand opening on May 9, 2015. The park was inspired by Chloe Bennett who has cerebral palsy. The park is fully accessible for children of all ages and disabilities.
- The City refinanced its 2006 Municipal Building Authority bonds with a lower interest rate saving the City an estimated \$286,000 over the remaining life of the bonds.
- The City was awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 5th year in a row from the Government Finance Officers Association.
- The City elected to pay off its 2005 Sales Tax Bond 6 years early saving the City \$108,875 in interest cost. The total principal payoff was \$985,000.



## Property Taxes - How do we stack up?





The General Fund is the primary operating fund of the City. It exists to account for the resources used to pay for the services traditionally associated with local government. Included are police and fire protection, parks and recreation, planning and economic development, general administration of the City, and any other activity for which a special fund has not been created. 


## Property Tax Information

Did you know that Syracuse City only receives about 11.7% of the total property tax you pay each year? The average home value in Syracuse City is approximately \$250,000. Each home owner who lives in their primary residence is given a 45% tax exemption on that home. This means that a home with an appraised value of \$250,000 is only subject to a taxable value of \$137,500. This home is assessed a total property tax of \$1,932.01 each year. Syracuse City only receives \$225.36 or 11.7%. The remainder of the taxes are distributed to other taxing entities as shown below in the table on the left. Davis School District is the largest taxing entity. The average home owner pays \$1,176.31 or 60.9% of their property tax bill to the Davis School District. The table below on the right shows how Syracuse City uses the \$225.36 from the average home to provide services to that home. The police department receives \$60.26 or 26.7% per year and the fire department receives \$41.75 or 18.5% per year. Together, approximately 45.2% of the taxes paid to the city go to fund public safety.


### Resident Property Tax Bill - What is Charged and Where Does It Go?

## Maintaining Level of Service

One of the biggest challenges that Syracuse city faces is maintaining our level of service to its citizens. The city has grown from a small farming community in 1990 with a population of 4,864, to a thriving bedroom community with a population of approximately 27,000 residents today. We estimate that the City will grow to approximately 35,000 residents in 2025 with a projected build out of approximately 55,000 residents. With a growing city, challenges arise in making sure we maintain a high level of service to our citizens. This means that we will likely need to add staff, equipment, vehicles, and other resources in order to ensure the needs of the citizens will be met. Syracuse City is proud to say that the property taxes in Syracuse are one of the lowest in the surrounding area. We will continue to work hard and strive to keep your taxes low all while providing great service to our citizens.
